HELLO FROM JEREMY

Dear Friends,

By the time you read this one twelfth of 2022 will have already passed. However, I would still like to wish you all a belated “Happy New Year” and thank you for your cards and good wishes over Christmas, and to say how good it was, despite the pandemic, to see so many of you at the various services over the Christmas period. It’s always a joy to know that people want to celebrate the real story of Christmas, and I hope you all had a good Christmas and enjoyed the New Year celebrations and were able to see family and friends who you haven’t been able to see for a long time.

If you passed by the Rectory in January you might have noticed that we still had our Christmas lights on, and if you visit the churches you will see that the cribs are still set up. This is because historically Christmas was celebrated for 40 days, from 25th December, throughout the season of Epiphany until the feast of Candlemas or the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple which takes place on the 2nd February, and so the lights and crib have remained until then.

Hopefully compared with 2020 or 2021, life will be a lot better for us in 2022, however, in a world of change it is always comforting to know there is always the changelessness of God, which we see in the life of Jesus, and learn about Sunday by Sunday at church.

A cartoon I once saw portrayed Moses on the top of Mount Sinai holding the stone tablets with the Ten Commandments written on them looking up into the sky. A speech bubble comes from Moses’ mouth, “They tend to lose interest rather quickly Lord. Could we have a one-liner instead?”

I suppose if we were to put a one-liner into God’s mouth, in the light of the Ten Commandments it could be “Relationships matter”.

But Jesus put it better when he told us “To love God and our neighbour as ourselves.”


One-liners are easy to remember and memory being what it is they are at times a Godsend. So, in the Ten Commandments God is saying something like this: “Be this kind of people and you will be my kind of people”.

John Connally, the Texas Governor wounded when President Kennedy was assassinated, said about the incident “it inevitably brought into sharper focus what’s really important in life.....we try not to participate in things that are shallow or in the long run meaningless”.

The gospel commands are neither “shallow or in the long run meaningless”, so if we want to be God’s kind of people, we need to love God and our neighbour as ourselves. And if we try to do this, our lives will be made all the richer whatever befalls the world in 2022.

In the church calendar this year we take a breathing space between Christmas and the start of Lent as Ash Wednesday isn’t until 2nd March. During Lent I am planning to hold a Lent Group. This will probably be a course based on a film. Once I have finalised details regarding the course, the venue and the days it will take place, we will put the details on the website and send out the details in the weekly e-mail.

INTERCESSIONS FOR THE PEOPLE AND ORGANISATIONS OF THE BENEFICE

At times prayer can seem to be the most natural thing in the world. At others it can feel strange or difficult, even pointless. If you've ever felt like that, don't worry – so have endless numbers of Christians, including the great saints. Part of the wonder of prayer – and it's difficulty – lies in the fact that as we pray we are addressing someone, something, beyond us, unseen. Books on prayer sometimes tell us that we should think of prayer as a conversation, and there is truth in this. But when we are having a conversation we normally have the advantage of being immediately aware of the other person's reaction to what we say, and this is even true of telephone conversations. But it is not the same with God – at least not usually. As we grow in our relationship with God, including through prayer, we may discover a closeness in which the aspects of conversation are more obviously present. But even for some faithful and prayerful people, it never happens quite like that. It is important in seeking to grow in prayer we don't beat ourselves up with guilt because we don't feel we are "getting it right".

Formal prayers in church can sometimes make us feel that we have to use special sorts of language when we pray. We don't. Just be yourself and say things that are on your heart in your own way. Some people find it helpful to have a book of prayers that they can draw from. Others prefer only to use their own words. I guess most people do a mixture of both. What matters is what is right for you.

If it seems as though you can only pray if you have lots of time, don't forget that there is also value in those quick little arrow prayers that we offer amid the rush of the day which keep the lines of communication with God open.

Before he went into the Battle of Edgehill in 1642, Jacob Astley, 1st Baron Astley of Reading prayed:

“O Lord, Thou knowest how busy I must be this day
If I forget Thee, do not forget me.”

Find a prayer that speaks to you and meditate on each word one by one. For instance, the Jesus Prayer:

“Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner”.

You can also use your fingers to bring to mind different things to pray for—

1. **Thumb** — This is the strongest digit on your hand. Give thanks for all the strong things in your life, like home and family, relationships that support and sustain you.
2. **Index finger** — This is the pointing finger. Pray for all those people and things in your life who guide and help you. Friends, teachers, doctors, nurses, emergency services and so on.
3. **Middle finger** — This is the tallest finger. Pray for all the important people who have power in the world, like world leaders and their governments, members of parliament and local councillors, the Royal Family, other world leaders and their governments.
4. **Ring finger** — This is the weakest finger on your hand. It can't do much by itself. Remember the poor, the weak, the helpless, the hungry, the sick, the ill and the bereaved.
5. **Little finger** — This is the smallest and the last finger on your hand. Pray for yourself.

Do you have a need? A concern? God cares about you. Will you say a prayer to Him today?

Please pray for the following—

- For people to come forward to become Churchwardens at Aylmerton and at Beeston Regis
- For people to come forward to become members of the PCC
- For our church buildings that funds may be found for their urgent repair
- For All Saints, Beeston Regis who are taking our church outside its walls with the launch of “WILD CHURCH”. Pray that this will be an event that engages children and families with our Creator God and His Wildly Wonderful World, especially people who don't normally come to church.

REGULAR GIVING & GIFT AID CLAIMS

Here in the Quintet Benefice, we have suffered a loss of income due, partly, to a reduction in the amount put into the collection plate. Like everyone, we have also been hit by an increase in the costs for heating, lighting, etc. We are suffering serious financial difficulties.

Can we please ask everyone to consider increasing the amount that they give, no matter how small?

We are very grateful to all those church members who pay a regular amount by Standing Order and would strongly urge anyone who does not currently pay in this way to seriously consider doing so, as it helps with our forward planning.


If you are a UK taxpayer, please consider filling in a Gift Aid Form. The church can claim the tax you have paid back from HMRC – which is an extra 25p for every £1 you donate, or put another way, it increases your donation by 25% – that is so long as you have paid the basic rate of tax and make the donation from your own funds.

The church can also claim Gift Aid under the Small Donations Scheme for collections. Under these circumstances, please pay by cash, either in your envelopes or in not more than £20 notes, as we cannot claim Gift Aid under this scheme on cheques or large denomination notes.

If you require any further details, either about paying by Standing Order or about Gift Aid, then please speak to one of the Benefice Gift Aid Officers or one of the Treasurers.

Margaret was a regular member of the church at Holy Trinity, West Runton, and ran the Sunday School in the Rectory between 1963 and 1967. She was also an active member of the church group “The Young Wives”, which met at the Church Hall, and was eventually renamed as “The Runton Ladies”.

The funeral Service, followed by burial, is at the Church of the Holy Trinity, West Runton, on Monday 31st January at 11.00am. Family flowers only.
